Blue Ridge Parkway in May

Or Larry and Melinda Hester's Most Excellent Drive!

We travelled up and back down much of the Blue Ridge Parkway in May. Along the way, we retraced the AH Southeast Classic '23 rally routes to Mount Mitchell and Mount Pisgah. Excellent routes and naturally scenic drives.

North of Boone, NC in VA there are a couple of small stretches where the Parkway is constructed on the very crest of the Ridge. On these "crest" sections, narrow shoulders give way to very steep and long slopes down on both sides of the roadway. You get used to there being a drop-off on one side and an upward slope on the other side. Then, suddenly, you realize there is nothing but way, way down on both sides. Dramatically scenic, but it gets your full driving attention.

Two photos along the broader Parkway caught my eye. Located in Ashville, the Estes-Winn Antique Car Museum was founded by a car dealer who also restored antiquated vehicles to original condition. This 1967 photo of his dealership showed his lines; check out the bottom of his marquee.



(No, that is no flying saucer above the building; could not get that reflection out.)



The second photo was displayed at the top of Grandfather Mountain among many images portraying activities tied to the area. The caption reads "Sports Car Hill climbs in the 1950s and 1960s were exciting races where cars navigated the steep gravel roads from the bottom of the mountain to the top."

Number 9 sure looks like an Austin Healey BN7 or similar model. Incidentally, I used to drive a '59 MGA coupe like 114 in high school.

This photo from the internet gives a pretty good perspective of the last section of the hill climb challenge. The finish is



at the top right.

An excerpt: On a June day in 1953, nine months after Hugh Morton and his team at Grandfather Mountain dedicated the Mile High Swinging Bridge, a small group of sports car enthusiasts from the Greensboro-Burlington-Winston chapter of the Sports Car Club of North Carolina gathered on the road at the foot of the historic mountain. They, along with Morton, wanted to see how fast they could climb the winding two-and-a half-mile road with an elevation increase of 1,000 feet during a race to the top against the clock. An average tourist driver would take about ten minutes to maneuver the 28-turn trip to the Swinging Bridge, but these sports cars, with their tremendous horsepower, could do it

much faster. On that June day a Jaguar made the run in 4 minutes, 55 seconds—and the idea for a "hill climb" caught on.

June was hot! We had a nice evening meal at Specht's Texas in Bulverde, TX. Its a great hill country hangout! Check it out!

August was hotter! We visited the Museum of Ice Cream in the Domain in Austin. Those attending: Bonnie and David Ayer, Brett and Julie Miller. Good ice cream with lots of people. Expensive.
